#### **BACKGROUND ON THE EARLY LEARNING FACILITIES (ELF) FUND**

Through ELF Fund programs, <u>Early</u>
Childhood Education and Assistance
Program (ECEAP) and/or <u>Working</u>
Connections Child Care (WCCC)
providers can access grants for predevelopment, remodel, purchase, construction, and/or minor renovations of early learning facilities and classrooms. ELF Fund resources are distributed through three grant programs including:

- Eligible organizations grant
- Health and safety minor renovation grant
- Public school district grant



To support providers undertaking capital projects, the Department of Commerce and the Department of Children, Youth, and Families contract with community-based organizations with specialized expertise, including:

- Enterprise Community Partners. Together with the Washington Community Reinvestment Association and Craft3, Enterprise provides grants, early learning facilities technical assistance, and low-cost, flexible, lending opportunities—often to assist with match requirements or start-up costs that ELF grants don't pay for —through the Washington Early Learning Loan (WELL) Fund.
- Imagine Institute. The Imagine Institute currently provides technical
  assistance to ELF Fund applicants to support equitable language access.
  Imagine has also provided application and pre-contract assistance
  through previous grant programs.

## THE ELF FUND HAS SIGNIFICANTLY INCREASED ACCESS TO EARLY LEARNING

Since its inception in 2017, the ELF Fund has retained and/or created a total of 17,676 early learning slots and has leveraged \$274.4 million in non-state resources. Many of these resources have been prioritized for communities in greatest need, including rural counties and/or small cities and towns; child care deserts (where the demand for care far outweighs the supply); and communities with low incomes.
